Census is capped at 80 (licensed at 120), and hovers between 77-80 depending on hospitalizations. Some delays in preparing the back parking lot (formerly the Rose Garden). Asbestos in the East Wing requires mitigation before demolition. A contractor accidentally cut all the fiber optics cables causing an outage for a couple of days. Trees in the construction area have been removed. These will be replaced as a part of the new home construction.

Activities continue. Families and volunteers are still involved. The Borbonus Foundation donated \$50k over the holidays to the activities department.

The Boise Home is preparing for surveys.

The Customer Satisfaction scores are unusually low at a 4.33 average. The context regarding this lower-than-normal satisfaction score relates to an extended kitchen remodel project. While this project was ongoing, Lewiston Home had to cater meals. The residents were unhappy with the quality of the meals catered. Since the Kitchen remodel was completed and normal services resumed, residents have been very pleased with the quality of meals.

HVAC system projected completion in February 2026.

Activities and Events: October hosted a non-alcoholic "Beer House Crawl" in the Home to celebrate Oktoberfest. Also hosted community children for trick or treating. Had local Veterans groups in the Home to honor residents during Veterans Day. Spirit of Freedom Awards were awarded in December instead of Veterans Day due to the federal government shutdown.

VA Survey team were in the home in December. They were very complimentary of the facility and the staff.

CMS Survey – Citation for abuse allegation was substantiated. The Post Falls Team did everything correct in handling it appropriately and according to regulations. They still unfortunately receive a CMS "Red Hand" tag that won't fall off until after 2 CMS Survey cycles.

Questions/Comments: Chairman Callihan acknowledged that all the State Veterans Homes receive a significant amount of community support. If there are special contributors that any of the Homes would like to recognize please run it up the chain of command so that we can honor them.

Chairman Callihan asked if State Employees are surveyed for Job Satisfaction and whether exit surveys are conducted. – State Employees receive an annual survey, and Mark Tschampl receives the results and shares with Bureau Chiefs. When feasible, HR will conduct exit surveys of staff who depart the organization.

December 2025 had 1,004 Office Interviews (+99), 1,036 Claims filed (+185) and 133 Home Visits (+3).

Noteworthy Issues Currently Happening with the VA

- Partial Government Shutdown ended. The OVA employees that worked in the VARO had to work remotely from October 3rd until November 13th.
- 2026 Cost of Living Allowance Increase is 2.8%. New Compensation, Pension and Survivor Benefit Rate tables are now posted.
- With the 2026 COLA, the Non-Service-Connected Burial Allowance and Plot Allowance Rates were increased to \$1,000. Service-Connected Burial Allowance remains at \$2,000.
- After the Government Shutdown ended, VA implemented mandatory overtime to reduce the number of backlogged claims (claims over 125 days old) and reduced the number to under 100k on December 20th
- There are currently 4,000 claims for Idaho Veterans pending with an average of 123.5 days for claims to be completed
- Rshetta Smith will continue to serve as the Acting Boise VA Regional Office Director through the end of the calendar year.
- VA Sunset-ed the Stakeholders Enterprise Portal (SEP) system in December and rolled out its replacement- The Accredited Representative Portal (ARP)
- Boise VARO remains instrumental in Automated claims processing.

- Future OVA Personnel moves – Stacy Whitmore (VSO Lewiston) has submitted intent to retire 04/01/2026 and Kelly McCartney (VSO Caldwell) has submitted intent to retire 05/01/2026
- 2026 VFW Proficiency Training Course will be in Annapolis, MD April 26-29, 2026
- The 2026 County and Post Service Officer Training was held on August 5-7th at the Riverside Hotel, Boise.
- Began conducting monthly outreach in Kuna once per month (Nick Percy) and Idaho Falls every Tuesday (alternate between Paul and Emberly).

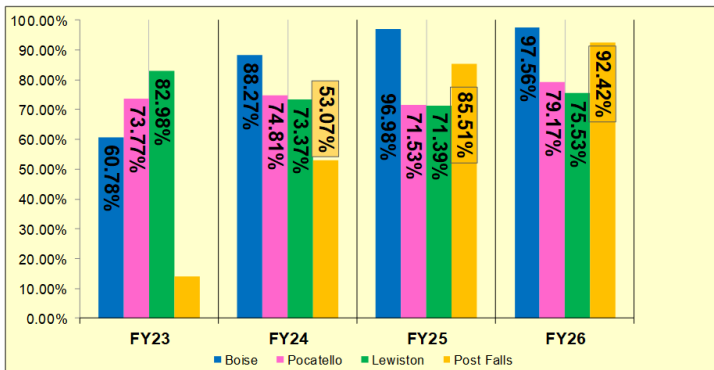
Other Important Events/Information

- Dec The Idaho Veterans Wreaths wreath laying event was held; 500+ members of the community were in attendance to place a wreath at a Veteran's grave.

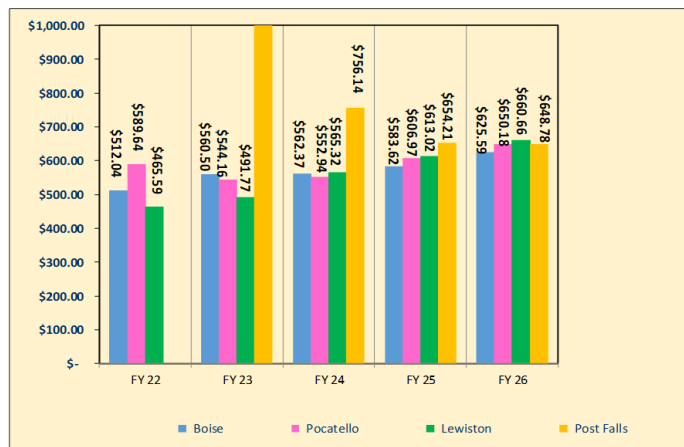

Business Support, HR, and Education – presented by **Paul Spannkebel**

The Legislative Session will likely be focused on reducing budgets.

No pay raises are recommended for this fiscal year.

Actively recruiting for nursing vacancies.

There is an uptick in appeals regarding separations. This is an issue across all agencies and not just IDVS.

We continue to work to reduce reliance on staffing agencies through our pool of temporary nurses.

Education Report

Keeping Tabs on the Cooperative Contract Agreement with the VA:

FY26 Allocation is \$181,830

- Will submit for VA's Q1 reimbursement by end of January (2026)
- FY26 COLA
 - VA to release the projected increase in allocation due to COLA by end of January 2026.
 - COLA, per the US Social Security Administration, is set at 2.8% for 2026.
- Supplemental request for FY25 was submitted 12/16/2025 for \$112,012.81
 - Supplementals are submitted to Idaho's VACO representative.
 - The team's VACO representative confirmed requested amount aligned with FY25's shortfall of funding on 12/26/2025.
 - The team is waiting for confirmation of available funding; if so, then the teams will wait on VA's education director to sign off on the release of the requested supplemental funding.
 - If the request for Supplemental is approved, it will increase the FY25's total allocation to \$314,041.81.
- VA's FY25 Ending Allocation was \$202,029.00

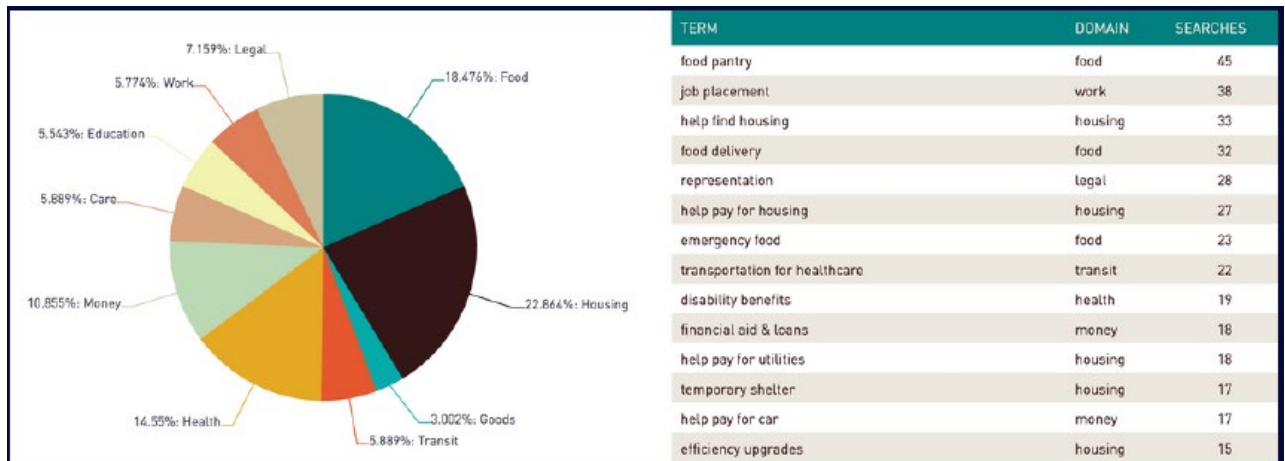

Central Support Office Updates presented by Tracy Schaner

Construction

- Since our Groundbreaking Ceremony, there's been a lot of **construction activity** at the Boise Home.
 - We've had some asbestos abatement and possible lead abatement hurdles along with some additional construction challenges and these won't be our last. Unfortunately, this is typical in the construction world and won't be the last. These issues have set us back in the schedule a few weeks.
- VA **SHCGP FY26 Priority List** was expected to be released within the 1st quarter, before December 31st; however, with the government shutdown it got delated and the SHCGP is now hoping it will be released during the 2nd quarter (by end of March).
 - In December NASVH learned that congress appropriated \$275M in FY26 for the VA's SVHGP. Based on this there is a very high probability that both Lewiston and Pocatello will receive a grant opportunity when the FY26 PL is released.
 - Unfortunately, we had to transfer Pocatello's state matching funds to the Boise Project; however, Mark did go to PBFAC as part of our FY27 budget and requested \$10M so we could

give the majority back to Pocatello.

- We've restarted the Lewiston project
 - Mark H. and I have meetings with our design team later this month to get our plan to 100% as well as move forward on obtaining the research to request our availability BABA waiver
- **VA SEC is scheduled to visit on 1/20** – we learned about his plan to visit Idaho about 3 weeks ago and this was confirmed yesterday.
 - Mark. T and I have a meeting on Monday with the VACO Mission Ops team to discuss the logistics and security requirements since we will be providing a tour of the Boise construction site
- **Gov. Little State of the State address will be held next Monday the 12th.**
- We are on the JFAC schedule for our budget to be presented on Thursday 1/29 at approximately 8:30AM.
- **National SVH Update GGAC Update** – During our last Commission meeting, I reported that the VA had recommenced the GGAC, the federal advisory committee to which I was appointed by the VA Secretary. The next meeting had been scheduled for December 10; however, in late November the committee was informed by the VA that, “due to circumstances beyond their control,” the meeting was canceled. The VA indicated they will attempt to reschedule the meeting for late winter, after the New Year.
- **S. 3532 – As I've previously reported** over the past year, I have been working with Senator Crapo's DC Office related to the elimination of the duplicative survey process. I'm excited to share that on 12/17, Senator Crapo introduced the State Veterans Home Inspection Simplification Act, which would streamline redundant inspection requirements for State Veterans Homes (SVHs).
 - The bill would allow SVHs to forgo the duplicative CMS survey if they have met all the requirements of the annual VA survey.
 - It is also anticipated that a House companion bill will be introduced soon.
 - In discussion with my contact at AHCA related to an IDVS matter this topic was discussed and AHCA decided to endorse the bill. An article announcing this endorsement was released just yesterday.

New Business

OVA is still seeing issues with Claim Sharks taking advantage of Veterans in Idaho.

The VFW Midwinter Conference is next weekend.

The Next IVAC Meeting is tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, April 15, 2026, at the Central Support Office (351 Collins Road Boise, ID 83702).

Chairman Callihan is open to a motion to adjourn. **Commissioner Brown** motioned to adjourn at 10:44 AM MT. **Commissioner Gimpel** seconded. The motion was approved with unanimous assent. Meeting was adjourned at 10:44 AM MT
